


# Medicare - Don't Screw It Up Know the Rules

The patient must require skilled nursing services and/or skilled rehabilitation services.



As a practical matter, considering economy and efficiency, the daily skilled services can be provided only on an inpatient basis in a skilled nursing facility.

The services are reasonable and necessary for treatment of the illness or injury.



The patient is being treated in the SNF for the same illness or injury (or a related condition) for which he/she was treated in the hospital.

The patient has received services in a hospital for at least three consecutive days.

The patient is transferred to the SNF within thirty days of discharge from the hospital.



On Monday, November 1, at 2 a.m., Agatha A. is admitted from home to an acute care hospital. On Wednesday, November 3, at 3 p.m., she is discharged to your nursing facility. Assuming that she requires skilled nursing care on a daily basis, can you admit Agatha under Part A?

On **November 1** at 11 p.m., Bertina B. goes from home to the ER. She is seen in the ER and admitted to the observation area of the acute care hospital at 3 a.m. on **November 2**. On **November 3**, she is admitted to the acute care hospital in an inpatient bed. On **November 5**, at 2 p.m., she is discharged to your nursing facility. Assuming that she requires skilled nursing care on a daily basis, can you admit Bertina under Part A?

On November 3, you receive a call from a worried son. His mother, Carlotta C., was traveling in Europe, fell in Paris and fractured her hip. She has been in a hospital in Paris for a week, and they want to discharge her. He is willing to pay for the airfare to fly her to your nursing facility. Assuming that she requires skilled nursing care on a daily basis, can you admit Carlotta under Part A?

On **November 1**, Daniel D. leaves your facility and is admitted to a psychiatric hospital for evaluation and treatment because he is confused and combative. On **November 16**, he is ready to return to your facility. Can you admit Daniel under Part A?

On **October 1**, Evelyn E. is admitted to an acute care hospital.

She is discharged to home on October 7.

On **October 25**, the family decides that she is not faring well at home, and they call your nursing facility. Assuming that she requires skilled nursing care on a daily basis, can you admit Evelyn under Part A?

On **October 1**, Francesca F. is admitted to an acute care hospital. She is discharged to another nursing facility on **October 7** where she is covered under Part A. She leaves that facility on **October 25** and returns home.

On **November 8**, the family decides that she is not faring well at home, and they call your nursing facility. Assuming that she requires skilled nursing care on a daily basis, can you admit Francesca under Part A?

Gertie G. leaves the acute care hospital after a three day qualifying stay on **June 28**. She is admitted to your facility on a Medicare Advantage Plan. The Advantage Plan cuts her on **July 28**. She converts to Traditional Medicare Part A on August 1. You believe that she continues to required skilled nursing care on a daily basis. Can you start her on Part A on August 1?

On May 26, Harold H. is discharged from the acute care hospital to your facility after a qualifying three-day stay. On June 1, Harold turns 65 and becomes a Medicare beneficiary. He receives skilled services through June 29. Can you cover those services under Part A?

Irina I. is a resident of your facility. She is currently receiving the Medicare hospice benefit due to her diagnosis of liver cancer. She falls and breaks her hip. She is admitted to the hospital and remains there for 4 days. When she returns to your facility, can you admit her under Part A for rehab?

A benefit period begins when a beneficiary is admitted to a hospital. It ends when the beneficiary has received less than a skilled level of care in an inpatient facility for 60 days.

Marianna M. is admitted to the nursing facility on January 1 after a qualifying hospital stay. She has decubitus ulcers that qualify for Medicare coverage. On March 1 (60 days later), her condition improves to the point that she no longer qualifies for Part A coverage. She remains in the facility. On March 20, she is admitted to a hospital for an acute CVA. After a two week stay, she returns to the facility at a skilled level of care.

Nancy N. is admitted to the nursing facility on January 1 after a qualifying hospital stay. She has decubitus ulcers that qualify for Medicare coverage. On March 6 (65 days later), her condition improves to the point that she no longer qualifies for Part A coverage. She remains in the nursing facility. On September 1, she is admitted to a hospital for an acute CVA. After a two week stay, she returns to the facility at a skilled level of care.

Ophelia O. is admitted to the nursing facility on **January 1** after a qualifying hospital stay. She has a g-tube and receives tube feedings. On **April 10**, her 100 day benefit period expires. She remains in the facility's certified section and continues to receive the majority of her nutrition by tube. On **October 1**, she is admitted to a hospital for an acute CVA. After a two week stay, she returns to the facility at a skilled level of care.

Pauline P. is admitted to the nursing facility on January 1 after a qualifying hospital stay. She is covered by Part A for 100 days. On April 10, her 100 day benefit period expires. She remains in the nursing facility and receives physical therapy three days a week and occupational therapy on the other two days a week. On June 15, she is admitted to the acute care facility. She returns to the nursing facility on June 25, requiring daily skilled care.

Quinton Q. is admitted to the nursing facility on **January 1** after a qualifying hospital stay. He has a g-tube and receives tube feedings. On April 10, his 100 day benefit period expires. He remains in the nursing facility and continues to receive the majority of his nutrition by tube until May 1 when he goes home. His daughter arranges for a home health nurse to come in and monitor his feeding tube. On October 1, he is admitted to a hospital with a fractured hip. After a two week stay, he returns to the facility, still with the same feeding tube, but requiring skilled therapy on a daily basis.

Rosario R. is admitted to the nursing facility on **January 1**. She is covered by Part A for 14 days, then she is properly cut from the program because she is no longer receiving skilled care. On **March 1**, she goes to the hospital and is admitted for observation. On **March 2**, she is readmitted to the nursing facility, but she is not receiving skilled care. On **April 1**, she falls and breaks her hip. She is admitted to the hospital and remains there for 4 qualifying days. On **April 5**, she returns to your facility, requiring daily skilled therapy.

























## **Eligibility Answers**

Agatha – no – needs 3 midnights

Bertina – no – ER and observation don't count

Carlotta – yes

Daniel – yes, but be careful

Evelyn – yes – she was admitted within 30 days

Francesca – yes – back to SNF within 30 days

Gertie – yes

Harold – no – hospital discharge must be in month of eligibility

Irina – yes, if stay is not related to hospice diagnosis

Marianna – 40 days – still in original benefit period

Nancy – 100 days

Ophelia – no days available

Pauline – no days available

Quinton – 100 days

Rosario – 100 days
